



In the 2025-26 season, there are more ways than ever to enjoy the Thunder across a wide variety of platforms, including streaming, cable, satellite, local TV, and radio. The broadcast schedule is anchored by 67 games on FanDuel Sports Network and the FanDuel Sports Network app. The team is scheduled for 34 national broadcasts on NBA partners ABC/ESPN, NBC/Peacock, and Amazon Prime. 15 of those national broadcasts will be exclusive.

Have a Question?

For the third straight season, the Thunder is partnering with Griffin Media to simulcast games on its local stations in Oklahoma City and Tulsa. The games are scheduled to air on Griffin stations KWTW-9 in OKC and KOTV-6 in Tulsa, as well as Gray Media

stations KSWO in Lawton and KWCH and KSCW in Wichita, KS.

Frequently Asked Questions

How can I watch the Thunder on TV this season?

Unless a game is a national TV exclusive, Thunder games are available in the Thunder viewing region on FanDuel Sports Network and streaming on the FanDuel Sports Network app. To find a TV provider in a local or regional zip code that carries the FanDuel Sports Network, go to GetMyHomeTeams.com.

In addition, two remaining games are scheduled for simulcast on Griffin Media stations in OKC (KWTV-9) and Tulsa (KOTV-6) and Gray Media stations in Lawton (KSWO-7), and Wichita (KWCH-12 and KSCW-33).

The Thunder is scheduled to appear 34 times on national TV this season on ABC/ESPN, NBC/Peacock, and Amazon Prime.

What about streaming?

FanDuel Sports Network games are available to stream via the FanDuel Sports Network app, either through the authentication of the appropriate TV provider (COX, other cable, DirecTV, DirecTV Stream, Fubo, U-Verse) OR the FanDuel Network app subscription service.

The app is available wherever you download apps or at fanduelsportsnetwork.com

New this season, local Prime Video customers can sign up to stream FanDuel Sports Network as an add-on subscription.

On what devices is the FanDuel Sports Network app available?

The FanDuel Sports Network app is available for download on most iOS devices, on most Android devices, and on most Windows PCs and tablets. It is also available on most living room/connected-device platforms.

Why is Thunder still not on YouTube TV or Hulu?

That is an issue beyond the Thunder's control.

Why can't I get the Thunder on NBA League Pass?

Under longstanding NBA Rules, local teams' games are blacked out in their markets.

Why can't you put more games on Griffin/Gray local TV stations?

Under an agreement between the NBA and FanDuel Sports Network, the number of games available for local simulcast was limited to four for this season.

With FanDuel Sports Network as the name, does that mean fans can bet on games?

Currently, sports betting is not permitted in Oklahoma, although the Thunder supports legal statewide sports betting in our state.

Broadcaster Info

Chris Fisher



Chris Fisher joined the broadcasting team in the 2018-19 season as the television play-by-play announcer for the Oklahoma City Thunder on FanDuel Sports Network. A graduate of the University of Southern California, Fisher came to Oklahoma City from Los Angeles, where he served as the radio voice for USC basketball for eight years, as well as host for Trojan football broadcasts. Fisher's television work includes basketball play-by-play for FS1, FOX Sports West, the PAC 12 Network and Time Warner Cable. During his career, Fisher also worked in broadcasting for minor league baseball teams including the Eugene (Ore.) Emeralds, a minor league affiliate of the San Diego Padres, and the Potomac Nationals in Woodbridge, Virginia, an affiliate of the Washington Nationals.

Michael Cage



Michael Cage joined the Thunder broadcasting team in 2014 as its television analyst for all local broadcasts. Cage played 15 seasons from 1984-2000 as a power forward in the NBA with the Los Angeles Clippers, Seattle SuperSonics, Cleveland Cavaliers, Philadelphia 76ers and New Jersey Nets. He led the NBA in rebounding in 1998, capturing the title by grabbing 30 rebounds in the final game of the regular season. Cage played in 1,140 total NBA games, 736 consecutively which is top 5 all-time in NBA history.

A native of West Memphis, Arkansas, Cage was a first-round draft pick of the Clippers in 1984 following a successful career at San Diego State University. At SDSU he was named a second-team All-American in 1984 and twice was selected as Western Athletic Conference Player of the Year. The Aztecs retired his jersey (No. 44) in 1984 and officially hung it in the rafters in 2023. He was also a member of the gold-medal winning 1983 United States team in the Pan American Games and is a member of both the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame and the San Diego State Hall of Fame.

Following his playing career, Cage has worked as both a broadcaster and a high school and AAU basketball coach. His broadcasting experience includes serving as TV analyst for the Memphis Grizzlies, FOX Sports West, ESPN, Prine Ticket and Westwood One radio. Cage coached Mater Dei High School in Los Angeles to back-to-back state titles in 2013-14 and a national

championship in 2014. He also served as a guest coach for the Cleveland Cavaliers at the 2013 NBA Summer League in Las Vegas.

Cage has a long history of giving back to the community during and after his NBA playing career. The Michael Cage Foundation works with young athletes to mentor, teach and share life lessons. Cage is a devoted father of three to daughters Alexis and Sydney and son Michael Jr.

Nick Gallo



Nick Gallo joined the Thunder in 2012 as the team's digital reporter. Beginning in the 2014-15 season, he has provided in-game courtside reports and postgame player interviews for FanDuel Sports Network television broadcasts. He also serves as a daily video reporter for @okcthunder social channels by producing game previews and recaps and one on one interviews. Gallo also creates content and writes articles for okcthunder.com, including features and community stories. He is the co-host of the Thunder Basketball Universe podcast and also serves as producer for OKC Thunder Films projects. Gallo also calls play by play for the Thunder's G League affiliate, the Oklahoma City Blue.

Prior to his arrival in Oklahoma City, Gallo worked as a reporter for the New York Jets for two seasons. Before that, he was a reporter for the Tennessee Titans for two seasons while attending Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. He also covered sports for the Vanderbilt Hustler before graduating in 2010 and wrote for the Chapel Hill News while growing up in his hometown of Durham, North Carolina. Gallo lives in Oklahoma City with his wife and three children.

Paris Lawson

Paris Lawson came to the Thunder just prior to the 2019-20 season as Digital Content Reporter and later joined the FanDuel Sports Network broadcast team as sideline reporter. In addition to sideline reporting, Lawson also serves as host of FanDuel Sports Network's Thunder Live pre-game and post-game shows. She also covers the team and the organization as co-host of the Thunder Basketball Universe podcast.



Prior to her time with the Thunder, Lawson spent years covering collegiate and professional athletics in her hometown of Nashville, TN. She has worked as a sideline reporter and analyst for television and radio coverage of women's volleyball, men's and women's basketball and USL soccer. Lawson graduated from Belmont University in Nashville where she played Division 1 basketball and won four consecutive Ohio Valley Conference Tournament championships earning four automatic berths to the NCAA tournament during her time.

Radio Info

Matt Pinto



Oklahoma City Thunder radio broadcaster Matt Pinto is a veteran NBA play-by-play announcer who has been with the franchise since 2007. He calls all games on the Thunder Radio Network, including flagship station WWLS, the Sports Animal (98.1 FM in OKC). Previously, Pinto served as the radio voice of the NBA's Clippers for two seasons. From 1997-2005, Pinto was on the Dallas Mavericks' broadcast team, serving as the radio play-by-play voice from 1997-2001 and the television voice from 2001-05. While in Dallas, Pinto also worked as a talk show host for KESN radio and was the play-by-play announcer of the NCAA Division IAA regional game of the week for The Football Network. In 1997, Pinto was named best play-by-play announcer for the state of Texas by the Associated Press.

From 1990-97, Pinto was the radio play-by-play voice of the NBA's Charlotte Hornets, where he was recognized in 1992 as the Premier Sportscaster in North Carolina by the Charlotte Observer. Pinto was also the television

play-by-play voice of UNC-Charlotte basketball games and was an occasional host of ESPN national sports talk shows, as well as serving as the play-by-play voice of Westwood One college basketball.

Before joining the NBA ranks, Pinto worked in the sports broadcasting field in Honolulu, Boston, Los Angeles and Amarillo, Texas. Pinto is married to his beautiful wife Courtney, is the proud father of four (Tamara, Daryl, Nash and Gabriela) and grandfather of two (Jackson and Amelia).

Eleno Ornelas



Eleno Ornelas joined the Thunder in 2009 as the Spanish radio play-by-play announcer, calling all Thunder home games on WKY (930 AM). Ornelas also serves as the Texas Rangers coordinator of Spanish broadcasting and the play-by-play announcer for all Rangers Spanish radio broadcasts. He joined the Rangers Spanish radio broadcast team in 2000, contributing both playby-play and analysis before becoming the full-time play-by-play announcer in 2003. He has done radio play-by-play for the Dallas Mavericks and covered the Dallas Cowboys. Ornelas, is a native of Juarez, Mexico and was a professional baseball announcer in that country before coming to Texas. He has an extensive background as an administrator in the Mexican amateur baseball leagues in north Texas, serving as president of the Dallas League from 1993-98. Ornelas made history when he became the first Spanish language announcer for winning teams in both an NBA Finals series (Thunder in 2025) and a World Series (Rangers in 2023).
